Please support children in practising the basics at home wherever possible - every little helps!


School Environment




















What do governors do and how do they actively support and challenge our school?

Governors support school by:

- Ensuring close links are maintained with St James' Church, understanding and promoting the distinctive Christian character
 of our Church school;
- Holding regular discussions, meetings and reviews with subject/area leaders to understand their intentions for the academic
 year and beyond and how these link with the academy's agreed priorities, review progress against these objectives and
 evaluate their impact to inform future planning. Meetings mare held termly, half termly or more regularly, as appropriate to a
 governor's area(s) of responsibility and outcomes of such meetings are reported back to the full governing body through
 written and verbal reports;
- Conducting regular learning walks to assess the school environment and triangulate observations with information provided by
 the Senior Leadership Team and external advisors who work with our school Can we see in practice what we are told is
 happening across school? Do the wider team reflect the vision set by school leaders? Do pupils have our school vision at the
 heart of their conduct?
- Valuing pupil voice and taking all opportunities to speak with pupils / gather evidence of pupil experience across all phases of school;
- Supporting staff wellbeing and professional development, within formal structures but also through encouragement, empathy
 and kindness;
- Communicating effectively with parents and carers, as appropriate, understanding the vital role of family within our school community;
- Supporting partnerships, such as the All Saints Partnership and others, recognising the value that partners bring to our own school development and our ethos of sharing best practice;
- Ensuring that committee members have relevant skills and experience in their areas of focus and that they can effectively
 communicate strengths or areas for development with other governors;
- Working with the findings of external inspections such as SIAMS and OFSTED reports to continue to drive positive change and development in the best interests of our school and its stakeholders;
- Developing governor practice around the six features of effective governance set out in the Governance Handbook: strategic leadership, accountability, people, structures, compliance and evaluation;
- Furthering their own knowledge and understanding through regular training opportunities so that their challenge of leadership and school development is effective, timely and relevant;
- Being ambassadors for our school, recognising the important role it plays both in our local community and global community as
 we prepare our pupils to be 'Ready for The Future'. The School Vision is at the heart of all governor activity.
